Founding of the Gulf Yachting Association

t a banquet given by Commodore Percy Benedict honoring the inners of the first Lipton regatta, the Pensacola Yacht Club, the ommodore presented a proposal for the forming of a yachting sociation of all yacht clubs on the Gulf Coast along with the same aid down by the Southern Gulf Coast Yachting Association, e parent organization organized in 1901, which had ceased to function afore World War I. The idea was received with much enthusiasm. ot since the founding of the Southern Yacht Club had there been eater stimulus to the sport of yachting along the Southern rim of the

United States than the coming of the Fish Class and the founding of the Gulf Yachting Association. Commodore Benedict's proposal had sensational appeal. A meeting was called in Mobile on November 13, 1920 with Commodore Ed. Overton of the Eastern Shore Yacht Club as host at the famous old Battle House Hotel. Invitations were extended to the Houston, Southern, Biloxi, Eastern Shore, and Pensacola Yacht Clubs, and these were enthusiastically received. —Flora K. Scheib


On behalf of the Flag Officers, Board of Directors and members, I would like to welcome you to the 79th SIR THOMAS LIPTON CHALLENGE.

The 1960's saw Mandeville move from a sleepy town to an emerging city. The causeway linking New Orleans to the northshore was completed in 1956. By 1969 the second span made travel across the 24 mile bridge easier and faster. All the while recreational boating, especially sailing, began to attract wider segments of the population.

A group of people began looking for ways to promote, foster, and afford opportunities for the enjoyment of boating. This led to Pontchartrain Yacht Club. The Charter of Pontchartrain Yacht Club was signed December 11, 1967. The first Board of Directors were: Dr. Lathan A. Crandall, Jr., A.R. Blossman, Jr., Frederick S. Ellis, William H. Deilly, Lawrence C. Thonn, Sr., and Charles T. Morse.


Later, property across from the Mandeville harbor on Jackson Avenue was purchased. The private home situated on the property underwent several renovations to meet the needs of the boating community. A swimming pool and boat storage facilities were added early on.

Graduaily, adjacent lands were purchased, enabling members to enjoy picnicking under shade trees, as well as, providing a field for informal games of volleyball, football and tag.

Racing sailboats has always been popular, so the club is a long time member of the Gulf Yachting Association.

The summer sailing classes for children are an important service provided to children. There are usually five sessions held each summer.

In 1994, after months of negotiation, PONT.Y.C. purchased the piece of property across the street from the club house and on

The majority of members are from Mandeville and Covington. However, PONT Y.C. attracts sailing enthusiasts from across south Louisiana. The majority of out-of-parish (county) members are from Hammond, Baton Rouge, Metairie, Kenner, New Orleans, and Lafayette.
